### The Big Picture

**Reading** - Children will learn the skill of *inference* and *comparison*. They will be exploring two texts that both feature characters alone on the moon and comparing the texts. They will be using the clues found in the text to explore the characters' *feelings* and *emotions*.

**Writing** - Children will be writing *Instructive Texts* based on *Baboon on the Moon*. They will also be writing an *Epistolary* based on both *Baboon on the Moon* and *Man on the Moon*. Finally, they will write  *kennings Poem* based on *Man on the Moon*.

Key Vocabulary (Grammar)	
<b>Noun</b>	A person, place or thing e.g. <i>Dejah, Paris or butterfly</i>
<b>Adjective</b>	A word that describes a noun e.g. <i>blue butterfly</i>
<b>Verb</b>	A 'doing word' or action e.g. <i>carry, hold, keep</i>
<b>Command</b>	A sentence in which an instruction is given e.g. <i>Cut the paper</i>
<b>Capital Letter</b>	An uppercase letter that indicates the beginning of a sentence or a proper



	noun. e.g. A boy called Ananya went to Paris.
Full Stop	A piece of punctuation that indicates the end of a sentence.
Finger Spaces	The spaces between words
Ascenders	Lower case letters that reach the top of the line e.g. t h k l
Descenders	Lower case letters that reach below the line e.g. g j p y
Instructive Writing	Writing that tells someone how to do something.
Epistolary Writing	Writing in the form of a series of letters.

Key Vocabulary (Reading)	
Vowels/Vowel Sounds	The letters a, e, i, o and u and the sounds that start with a vowel e.g. ay, ie or u-e
Consonant	All letters apart from vowels or sounds that start with letters that are not vowels e.g. c, ff or ch
Inference	Using clues from a text to help you understand. E.g. I know Baboon has a picture of his family so I think he is lonely.
Comparison	Using similar things from two stories to compare them. E.g. Comparing how Baboon and Bob feel when they are on the moon.
Prediction	Using clues from a text to predict what will happen next. E.g. There are aliens on every page so I think the aliens will meet Bob.
