Being a reader is one of the most important things we can do for our future success as and the benefits that children get from reading are well known.




Enquiry Questions

- Questions that tell us about other cultures, times and places. What makes this writer special and how does their writing compare with that of others? What time is this story set in? In what places does this story take place?
- Questions that help us explain how writers use words and how particular words and phrases make a text more powerful. Which words tell you how the character spoke? Which words/phrases create suspense here?
- Questions where we need to select and retrieve information from texts. What happened before/after/when ...? How are ... same/different?
- Questions where we find and talk about how books and stories are organised. Were you surprised by the ending? Why? What type of text is this?
- Questions about why the writer has written the text, what the writer thinks and what we think about a text. What did you like/dislike about this type of book? Do you know any other stories that have a character/theme like this one?
