

Evaluation of 2019-20

It is very difficult to evaluate the impact of last year's Pupil Premium Funding as the academic year was cut short due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The only data we have to analyse is the end of Autumn Term 2019 (December) to the end of Spring Term 2020 (March) which is less than 3 months of time for pupils to make progress.

Despite the short period of time, we can see that gaps narrowed in reading as evidenced by Teacher Assessment Data and STAR Assessment tests. There was no increase in gaps in writing. Gaps in maths increased as evidenced by Teacher Assessment Data and STAR Assessment tests.

STAR Assessment data showed that more Pupil Premium Pupils' scaled scores increased or stayed the same than their peers. However, in reading, Non-Pupil Premium Pupils made more progress in terms of reading age on their STAR Assessment tests.

This group of pupils were a particular focus during lockdown. We ensured food was received via food parcels and later, vouchers. In total £46,500 worth of vouchers were distributed (equivalent to 3100 meals) and £11,699 worth of food was distributed. Additional food parcels and activity packs were delivered weekly during the summer holidays to 30 families via a charity organised by the school. Regular contact was maintained via telephone and email from class teachers and pastoral staff. Laptops were given if needed to access home learning (11 Pupil Premium families).

In the 2019-20 cycle (April 2019- March 2020), Grange Primary received £229,000 of Pupil Premium Funding.
